HONORS ACADEMY DUAL CREDIT PROGRAM

TAKE THE FIRST STEP. Your college journey can begin while you are still in high school through UT Arlington's Honors Academy Dual Credit Program. The program is designed for highly motivated high school students who wish to gain college credit while also meeting high school graduation requirements. **



PROGRAM COST
Fifty dollars per semester hour or \$150 per three-hour course. Books and parking are extra.

SCHOLARSHIPS
Honors Academy Dual Credit Program students completing at least six hours at UT Arlington with a 3.0 GPA or above will be awarded a \$1,500 renewable scholarship to be used when they enroll as full-time entering freshmen at UT Arlington. The scholarship is renewable for up to four years as long as students maintain a 3.0 GPA.

To qualify for the scholarships, students must be admitted to the UT Arlington Honors Academy Dual Credit Program and must have scored a minimum of 120 on the math and critical reading sections of the PSAT, or scored a minimum of 1200 on the math and critical reading sections of the SAT, or be in the top 10 percent of their high school class. Students must be juniors or seniors from area public, private, or home schools.

**If a student does not meet these requirements, they can become eligible for the Honors Academy Dual Credit Program by achieving the minimum passing standards on one of the following approved TSI testing instruments: ACCUPLACER, Texas Higher Education Assessment (THEA) or ASSET or COMPASS.

**Students should contact their home school district or the Honors College for further information regarding dual credit.

HONORS ACADEMY DUAL CREDIT PROGRAM
Students can enroll in the Honors Academy Dual Credit Program following their junior or senior years of high school if they can show college readiness. One way is by demonstrating they are exempt under the provisions of the Texas Success Initiative (TSI) through one of the following:

- SAT I (Critical Reading + Math)* score of 1070 with scores of at least 500 in both subjects; or
- ACT* composite score of 23 with score of 19 in both math and English; or
- TAKS* scores of 2200 in both math and English/language arts and TAKS essay score of 3.

Applicants must submit:

- Applications for general admission and the Honors Academy Dual Credit Program;
- Official high school transcript showing coursework through their sophomore year;
- \$35 application fee.

Each individual admitted into the Honors Academy Dual Credit Program can enroll in up to eight hours of credit each semester and will receive credit for the coursework completed at the end of the semester. A permanent academic record will be established for each student enrolled under the Honors Academy Dual Credit Program.



Upon completion of the Honors Academy Dual Credit Program, a student who wishes to continue his or her studies at UT Arlington must complete a Freshman Application for Admission and submit an official final high school transcript showing graduation and final rank in class.

RECOMMENDED HIGH SCHOOL PLAN FOR COLLEGE-BOUND STUDENTS

English Language Arts (4 credits*)
English I, English II, English III, English IV (Advanced Placement courses may be substituted for English IV), Other

Mathematics (4 credits)
Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, Precalculus, Trigonometry, Elementary Analysis or Analytic Geometry**

Science (4 credits)
Physical Science, Biology I and II, Chemistry I and II, Physics I and II, Biology, Chemistry or Physics**

Social Studies (4 credits)
World History, World Geography, U.S. History, U.S. Government or Economics

Foreign Language (3 credits of the same language)
Spanish, French, Other

Physical Education (1 1/2 credits)
Health (1/2 credit)
Computing Proficiency (1 credit)

Fine Arts (1 credit)
Music, Theater, Art or Other

Elective (1 credit)

*One credit is equivalent to a one-year course.

**You may substitute specialized electives for these requirements. Specialization electives include courses in two areas: 1) language arts, science, social studies, fine arts, foreign language or computer science or 2) technical preparation, applied technology or vocational education. A variety of other courses not listed here, including developmental and remediation courses, are not acceptable for the college preparatory program.

- **11th Grade**
- Continue to take college prep courses.
 - Attend a college day or night program to collect information on different colleges.
 - Keep active in school and community activities.
 - Continue taking college entrance exam preparation classes.
 - Apply for and take the SAT-I or ACT with writing portion.
 - Investigate colleges regarding your interests, courses, support programs and financial aid.
 - Start narrowing down the number of colleges you are considering.
 - Continue to explore career interests and discuss them with your parents, teachers and school counselor.
 - Visit college campuses.

- **12th Grade**
- Make a final choice of three to five colleges that meet your needs and interests.
 - Visit your top choices and talk with admissions, financial aid and placement officers.
 - Apply for and take the SAT-I or ACT with writing portion again to improve scores.
 - Apply to the colleges on time.
 - Continue your college savings.
 - Keep taking challenging courses.
 - Continue to be active in your school and community.
 - Apply for financial aid.
 - Review financial aid packages offered by colleges, talk with the schools, and understand the school's responsibilities and your.
 - If you are considering a publicly funded college in the state of Texas, be sure to complete the Texas Success Initiatives requirements such as THEA.
 - Apply for private and university-wide scholarships.
 - Select your college.
